Unfortunately French Bulldogs have finally done it! and its not a cause for celebration, the UK's most popular breed according to Kennel Club Registration figures. 36,785 French Bulldogs were registered in 2018, this figure includes imported dogs as well as puppy registrations. The majority of these registrations were for CNR (colour not recognised) dogs. The breed really is in crisis! Brachycephalic breeds continue to attract negative press and it can only be hoped that demand for CNR puppies declines and the puppy breeders who have no interest in the breed standard turn their attention elsewhere. I hope members who continue to breed from show standard, health trested dogs are able to find good homes for the puppies they don't keep. On the plus side there is a wealth of health tests now available and the KC have launched a Respiratory Function Grading scheme with the University of Cambridge. Under the new scheme selected regional vets can grade dogs and the gradings are recorded on KC registrations. I've included the list of approved assessors in this edition.

Lori Hunt's final article on spines gives advise on how to improve spines for future generations and I'm grateful to her for sharing her personal research. Thank you to Maureen Bootle for her article on Frenchie Collectables. Once again thank you to the advertisers whose support helps pay postage costs. I'm grateful to Lorna Tilley for her record of Champ Show entries that I have included with the show results.

If anyone wants to take over the editing and production of Bat Ears please contact the Club's Secretary.

I hope you enjoy this edition.

# I've Got Your Back

#### Part 3: Back Talk Lori Hunt DVM

In the last two issues, I talked a lot about back disease in Frenchies; the signs, symptoms and causes. Now I'd like to talk about what we can do to make things better. This final part is less fact and more of the editorial opinion of its author.

In the OFA study done by Dr. Keller in 2004, a total of 245 dogs were radiographed and submitted. Of those dogs, 95.1% of those dogs were found to have at least one anomaly. 941 anomalies were found in the 245 dogs, which averages out to almost 4 anomalies per dog. 95.1% of these anomalies were found to be in the thoracic area. 19% of these dogs had 6 or more anomalies in the spine. 70% of the anomalies were located between T5-T9. Approximately 75% of the dogs had 3 or less in a row. 7 dogs in the study had herniated discs apparently unrelated to the anomalies. In my humble opinion, I feel these may be related in a way that isn't readily apparent, in that the rest of the back takes on some extra work due to anomalies in other areas which stresses and weakens the disc, perhaps leading to herniation.

Intervertebral disc disease is thought to be highly heritable in many breeds, like dachshunds, so it's likely the same in ours. I also believe that vertebral anomalies and their placement are at least somewhat inherited. Some is due to the mere fact of being a French bulldog and the conformation that comes with this breed.

So how can we eliminate back problems in French bulldogs? Well the honest answer is that I am not sure we can completely... I do however have some ideas I think will benefit the breed as a whole. When I started in Frenchies, I made a promise to myself that every breeding I did would be for the "betterment of the breed". I was determined to make my dogs healthier. So I'm going to share some things I have tried over the years. I have noticed a significant difference within my line. None of these will guarantee perfection, but I believe they can help. I have statistics from over 15 years and 8 generations since my first litter. I have seen a compelling improvement in the spines of my dogs, with a decrease in both the average number of anomalies and back incidences as they age.

Here's 10 common sense ideas you can do to attempt to lessen back issues within your breeding program as well as individual dogs. (These are the author's opinion)

1) Don't breed to dogs or from bitches who have had back problems and/or surgery.


- 2) Find a knowledgeable vet who can really read spine films, when in doubt send to a radiologist. **Radiograph all your puppies**, **even ones you don't keep**. When you have an opportunity to choose between several quality pups, try to keep the one with the least anomalies with which to move forward.
- 3) Keep in contact with your puppy owners so you can hear what issues develop. Often breeders place dogs after they are done breeding and many don't live with old dogs. Living with an old dog (or any age) with a back problem will certainly make you want to attempt to not produce it again.
- 4) Breed for less extreme back length, instead breed for a more moderate back length in balance with leg length. This almost certainly will come with less anomalies.
- 5) Breed only to dogs who've had spine films done. Knowledge is power.
- 6) **Breed to older males.** Dogs over the age of 6-8 years old who've not had back trouble, can be a great asset in a breeding program. Obviously, this isn't possible with bitches.
- 7) **Share your results**. With anyone and everyone. At the very least, share with those who breed into your lines. Similarly, ASK before breeding. Ask if there is a history or intervertebral disc disease, rear weakness or spinal stenosis before breeding to a dog.
- 8) Breed for dogs with decent neck length, good rib length and a short loin. Long loins are unstable. The majority of back length should be made up of rib cage, which supports the vertebrae and as an added bonus, will allow the dog to breathe better too.
- 9) Consider keeping dogs intact. Sex hormones add a lot to their health, muscle mass and generally keep them in better shape.
- 10) Keep all frenchies at ideal body mass and give them regular exercise.

As mentioned, these are my opinion and strategies and have been incredibly successful in my line. I'd love to get feedback from folks who start implementing these ideas and hear about your success.

A very special thank-you to the Committee to be invited to judge the 60th Anniversary Show,making me so welcome and spoiling me. It was a privilege with such a large entry, to be able to go over the cream of the breed. Unfortunately, it brought also to notice, those, who are subject to displaying, faults which are not in the interests of Health in the breed. Out of the whole entry, I would say, the percentage, would be in the minority, but it is important when breeding to only select healthy dogs as breeding stock!

The Breed is fortunate in having a very clear and detailed standard. Dogs, with short noses, or nose at all, should not be considered. I had some worries, that the tail should cover the anus! There were several I placed well that did not have a visible tail, but were excellent in other respects. Some eyes, showing white, and blood shot!. Small pinched jaws, and wry mouths, not acceptable.

Of course, we all know this Breed, the great characteristics are the 'Bat Ears'. Generally, all were correct, in facing forward, although ideally, they should be parallel to each other, and not 'east west'. Those, having read so far, will think, perhaps I have gone 'over the top' in my general critique. My main reason being that this wonderful breed, registrations hitting an all time high, must present a better face to its critics from the national media. I found some really lovely young stock in the early classes, which indicates the effort being made by the true fanciers in the breed, and of course augurs well for the future Therefore some of my report is concise.

The judging of French Bulldogs takes time, as one has to be careful not to throw the 'baby out with the bath water'. I can well understand why so many, have completely fallen for the charms of this sturdy, but small enough to be, cuddly dog. On the table, they were my best friend and inviting me to take them home! It is certainly a judging engagement, I will remember as being, very special, in a number of wavs.

Over many years, I have been sent the well produced Magazine BAT EARS, always a mine of information, and thank those responsible.





# FRENCH BULLDOG ITEMS WITH A DIFFERENCE! Servant Bells

In the early 1900s one summoned ones staff by ringing a hand bell. Those above, and the Gornik bronze opposite, came with the onset of electricity into the homes – and would have been in the houses of the wealthier families by the early 30s. The two on the left and the two on the right are bronze, and have holes where they were wired to the electricity supply; the one on the right still having some wire remaining. One simply pressed the button, or in the case of the 2<sup>nd</sup> from the left, the Frenchie, to ring for the servant.

The silver one in the centre, was also wired to the electricity supply, and is hallmarked London 1928. The base diameter is 2.25". The exquisite French Bulldog head (sorry, the photo does not do it justice) was pressed to call the maid – I am sure this would have been a lady's bell. This is one of my favourite pieces.

# **BREED APPRECIATION DAY**

This year the Midland and Northern Counties French Bulldog Club and the Pennine and Scottish French Bulldog Association will be jointly holding two Breed Appreciation Days - the first on 28<sup>th</sup> April at Swinton Masonic Hall, Swinton, Manchester and the second later in the year in the Midlands.

The Breed Appreciation Day (BAD) replaces the previous Breed Club Judging Seminar. The aim is to:

Educate individuals interested in the breed, be they exhibitors, aspiring judges or breeders, and provide them with information about the breed.

To test a candidate's knowledge of the Breed Standard via a Multiple-choice Breed Standard Exam.

Those who attend because they are interested in learning more about the breed, or updating their knowledge, and do not wish to sit the examination will obtain an Attendance Certificate which may be used later as part of the criteria for progression to (JCF) Level 2.

Only those attendees who have completed <u>all</u> the requirements necessary to be at JCF Level 1 may take the Multiple Choice Exam. A pass certificate may be used as part of the criteria for progression to JCF Level 2.

#### Structure Of The Day

There will be a Breed Presentation to provide the basic knowledge needed to establish and/or refresh understanding and appreciation of the breed. Special points relating to the French Bulldog, Breed Watch information and Movement are all covered in the presentation. The breed presentation is interactive with demonstration dogs being used to illustrate the standard and provide practical experience.

Knowledge gained through the presentation, together with information provided prior to the day, will help with answering questions in the subsequent multiple choice exam.

Candidates are encouraged to ask questions and there will be a "Question and Answer" session, with a panel of Championship Show judges, after the breed presentation.

The Multiple choice exam is held under test conditions and questions are selected from a bank of questions approved by The Kennel Club. The papers are marked by two people and candidates receive their results on the day.

The advantage of the scheme is that all Breed clubs will now hold identical days thus standardising judges' training.

# The KC Judges Competency Framework (JCF)

The Judges Competency Framework (JCF) was announced in the spring of 2017, has been piloted with 14 breeds, and will start to go 'live' in 2019. It will run alongside the current system for a transition period, and be fully operational from January 2022.

The requirement that all judges must be licenced at JCF Level 1 will now be introduced from 1 January 2020.

Before accepting your first judging appointment you must register a JCF account with a declaration of intent as an 'Aspiring Judge' and achieve JCF Level 1.

#### In order to achieve Level 1 you must have:

- 1. A proven interest of a minimum of 5 years in one or more aspects of the breeding and exhibiting pedigree dogs (including show administration/stewarding).
- 2. Undertaken 6 days of stewarding and completed and passed KCA stewarding multiple choice exam.
- 3. Attended a Kennel Club Requirements of Dog Show Judge and passed the exam.
- 4. Passed The Kennel Club Points of a Dog assessmen.
- 5. Attended a kennel Club Conformation and Movement seminar.
- 6. Completed and passed KCA online critique seminar and multiple choice exam..

Upon achieving this level you can accept appointments to judge up to 3 classes (or 4 if one class is a puppy class) at KC licensed Open/ Limited Shows.

### In order to move to Level 2 you must have:

- 1. Attended a Breed Appreciation Day for the breed you wish to judge.
- 2. Passed the subsequent multiple-choice Breed Standard Exam.
- 3. Refreshed Requirements of a Dog Show Judge Seminar exam every 5 years.

Then you can apply to the KC For JCF Level 2 status in that breed.

# **Breed Education Coordinator**

Sue Worrell has taken on the role of Breed Education Co-ordinator (BEC) for French Bulldogs: "The role is part of the new Judges Competency Framework (JCF) which comes into effect towards the end of 2019. Full details of the JCF have been available to judges and people interested in becoming a judge for quite some time now, and the information can be found online at: <a href="www.thekennelclub.org.uk/training/judges-education/breed-show-judges-training/">www.thekennelclub.org.uk/training/judges-education/breed-show-judges-training/</a>

The BEC is an administrative role to co-ordinate breed specific education and support for judges. The role will also involve co-ordinating the pairing of mentors and mentees and arranging for Observers. I will also be the point of contact for the KC with the breed, and report to them annually on breed education activity.

The breed clubs have been asked to forward details of members who have excellent breed knowledge and meet one of the following criteria:

- 1. Someone who awards CCs in the breed.
- 2. A judge who is currently judging or retired and has the regard of the breed club.
- 3. Judges with recognised and current experience in the breed but who may not have owned the breed.
- 4. A respected breeder/handler who does not judge or judges but not at CC level

The aim of mentoring is to educate judges of the breed and provide them with the information to make informed decisions to preserve and safeguard the breed. If anybody who meets the above criteria and would like to become a mentor or would like more information please contact me via email: <a href="mailto:becfrenchbulldogs@outlook.com">becfrenchbulldogs@outlook.com</a>
Mentoring can take place in four separate scenarios: group mentoring, one-to-one mentoring at the ringside, when mentees are judging Special Award Classes at a breed club show, and as a student judge in the ring with the mentor/judge at a show.

Mentors are welcome to specify which type of mentoring they would be happy to provide."

Judges that meet the JCF level 2 are eligible to request mentoring sessions. If anyone has any queries or would like any further information, please contact Sue on the above email address.



# A Brief History of The French Bulldog

Following a recent discussion I had regarding the 'country of origin' of French Bulldogs I decided to write a brief history of the breed. Put quite simply the breed does not have a single country as its country of origin! It is one of a few breeds which owes its existence to the efforts of breeders of more than one country. It is generally acknowledged that English, French and American breeders all played important roles in the development of what we now call The French Bulldog.

The foundation of the breed began in England, perhaps as a reaction to the demise of bull baiting when a smaller, less formidable Bulldog was desired. By 1850 little bulldogs were a common site in London, Nottingham and Birmingham. By 1860 a few were being exhibited at dog shows under the title 'Toy Bulldogs'. There were special classes for Bulldogs under 12 pounds, but the average small Bulldog weighed between 16 and 25 pounds. These lightweight Bulldogs varied in type- some had rose ears, others erect ears, some were short in the leg, others tall, some had long muzzles other short muzzels.

By 1850 the Industrial Revolution had begun to impact on the work availability for many English workers. Many workers moved to France to seek work, particularly in niche industries like lace working. Some of the lace workers of Nottingham who went to France to continue their work, took their small companion bulldogs with them. The little bulldogs were excellent guardians and particularly adept at vermin control. The French had never seen these miniature bulldogs before and fell in love with them. English breeders were delighted in this surge in popularity and gave them the opportunity to rid themselves of their 'undesirable stock' of small, tulip eared puppies. They became so popular in France that two London dog dealers specialized in exportimng them, and by 1860 they were virtually extinct in England!



Amongst their admirers in Paris were the 'Ladies of the night'. They became a part of their 'advertising' accoutrements just as their suggestive clothing and silk stockings were.

Their popularity in France spread to the higher echelons of French Society and it is reported that their popularity also spread to the Russian nobility who regularly imported puppies from France. It is thought that with the diminishing number of imports from England the French breeders introduced other breeds into the mix, to help meet the growing demand for puppies. It is believed terriers produced the high ears and longer bodies that began to distinguish them from the English type that had a more roached topline. Terrier would also account for their abilities as ratters and the longer tails.

By 1880 the French Bulldog was internationally popular and this provoked the interest of English breeders again. Mr Richard Harrison is credited with being the first breeder in England to reimport the breed around 1890. Also soon after Mr George Krehl also began a steady importation from France. At this time they were still known as "Toy Bulldogs' in England. The French however were concerned that the English would ruin the breed and decided to write a standard to differentiate the French Bulldog from the English Toy Bulldog. In England the original supporters of the true miniature Bulldog type were aghast at the French dogs that were being imported under the name of Toy Bulldog. As a consequence, in 1902 The Toy Bulldog Club split and a new breed club was set up The French Bulldog Club of England.

It was commented by Lady Kathleen Pilkington at the time that the French Bulldog had 'returned most attractive... but hampered by many undesirable features such as bat ears, froggy faces, waving tails and a general lack of Bulldog character.' By 1905 the KC gave the breed separate recognition under the breed name Le Bouldedogue Français. Later the name was changed to The French Bulldog.

By 1880 Paris was the cosmopolitan capital of the world and as well as the Russian nobility taking an interest in these small bulldog types, wealthy tourists from America travelled there and also fell in love with them. Many dogs were taken back to the States where they became very popular. A small group of dedicated breeders sought to improve the breed and very quickly were producing a more consistent type than had been seen anywhere else. In 1896 the first dogs were exhibited, unofficially, at Westminster in New York by a group of prominent society ladies. The press gave the exhibition a great deal of coverage which served to boost the demand for these dogs.

The following year the Westminster Catalogue featured a French Bulldog on its cover. The Judge for the first official show for French Bulldogs in the USA was an English Judge who selected only rose ear exhibits as his prize winners. (The English and French at the time preferred the rose ear.) The American exhibitors were outraged that the Bat Ear or Tulip Ear was being penalised and they decided to set up their own Breed Club; The French Bull Dog Club of America. That same year they wrote the world's first Official Breed Standard for The French Bull Dog. It is argued that had the Americans not defined the correct ear type as 'Bat Ears', dogs with this type of ear would have died out.

So there we have it. The French Bulldog we know today has no one country that can be defined as its country of origin despite its name! It originated in England was altered by the French and altered again in the USA.

# Reverse sneezing

This is a fairly common respiratory event in dogs. It happens more often in small breed dogs, perhaps because they have smaller throats and windpipes.

### How to Recognize an Episode of Reverse Sneezing

In a regular sneeze, air is pushed out through the nose. In a reverse sneeze, air is pulled rapidly and noisily in through the nose. For some dogs, it's a more or less normal event. Just as sneezing is a part of life, reverse sneezing is also a part of many dogs' lives.

The sound that accompanies reverse sneezing is kind of a sudden, startling sound that makes many dog owners think their pet is either choking or having an asthma attack.

A dog who is reverse sneezing typically stands still with his elbows spread apart, head extended or back, eyes bulging as he makes this loud snorting sound. The strange stance on top of the strange snorting sound is why many dogs end up getting rushed to the veterinarian or the emergency clinic by their panicked parents.

Episodes of reverse sneezing can last from a few seconds to a minute or two. As soon as it passes, the dog breathes perfectly normally.

### Causes of Reverse Sneezing and How You Can Help Your Pet

Reverse sneezing is caused by a spasm of the throat and soft palate. The spasm is triggered by an irritation to the throat, pharynx, or laryngeal area. The most common triggers are excitement, exercise intolerance, a collar that's too tight, pulling on the leash, an environmental irritant like pollen, perfume, or even a household chemical or cleaner, room sprays, or even a sudden change in temperature. Rarely, there can be a respiratory infection or chronic post-nasal drip that causes the condition.

In the winter, some dogs may reverse-sneeze every single time they go from inside to outside. Open the front door and they automatically reverse-sneeze. Reverse sneezing rarely requires treatment. As soon as the sneezing stops, the situation is resolved.

But since episodes of reverse sneezing can make your dog anxious, it's important that you remain calm. The biggest issue is a conditioned panic response in a pet, triggered by an owner who freaks out each time the dog reverse-sneezes.

If you feel the need to do something for your dog, you can try massaging her throat to stop the spasm. You can also try covering your pet's nostrils very briefly. This will cause her to swallow, which usually helps clear the irritation and stop the sneezing. You can also push their chin gently towards their chest to open up the airway.

If the episode doesn't end quickly and if you trust your dog's response, you can try putting your hand in her mouth and pressing on her tongue. This will cause her to open her mouth wider and help move air through the nose effectively.

But honestly, these types of intervention are usually not necessary and can sometimes add to everyone's stress level. I do recommend owners pay attention to when reverse sneezing occurs, where the dog is and what she's doing right before, or as it begins.

#### When to See the Vet

If your pet's reverse sneezing becomes a chronic problem, or episodes are becoming more frequent or longer in duration, make an appointment with your vet to rule out things like a potential foreign body in the respiratory tract, nasal cancers, polyps or tumors, nasal mites, a collapsing trachea, kennel cough, or a respiratory infection.

If you're able to catch a reverse sneezing episode on video to play for your vet, it can sometimes help him or her discern what's really happening – whether it's reverse sneezing or perhaps something else.

If your pet is experiencing prolonged episodes of reverse sneezing, bloody or yellow discharge from the nose, or any other accompanying respiratory problems, it's time to make an appointment with your vet. Just as dogs sneeze intermittently throughout their lives, most dogs have at least a few reverse sneezing episodes during their lives as well. In the vast majority of cases, the episodes are temporary and intermittent, resolving on their own.
