Show numbers throughout 2022 for our breed had a slight decrease which is more than understandable bearing in mind the state of our economy with ever increasing bills across the board. Our clubs 3 shows more than held their own with regards entries with our April Open show drawing a wonderful entry of 95 and our Championship show in September drawing a fabulous entry of 167

and our December Open show a entry of 65 so thanks to you all for your continued support.

We really do have a battle on our hands to protect our breed, there are a number of groups now calling for our breed to be band from showing at Crufts with a number of vets joining forces with them stating health issues as there main point of concern. We as a breed need to be showing these groups our breed is healthy and the only way we can do that is by health testing, we owe it to our breed and there simply is no excuse for not testing. We have a fabulous health testing team in place who are doing a sterling job so please let all get behind our breed and our health team who have worked tirelessly to go out on health testing events throughout the country.

Non standard colours are still proving to be a massive problem across many breeds now which continues to be a major worry across the board. I can't really see much light at the end of the tunnel on this subject which really pains me and continues to frustrate us all with regards to them still remaining on the same registration system as standard colours.



Dr Towner was a previous Committee member and long time supporter of the MNCFBC. We would like to pay tribute to and acknowledge their contribution and service to the Midland and Northern Counties French Bulldog Club. We hope the following eulogy's share fond memories and bring some comfort to family and friends.

Mrs Carol Burton

The Officers and Committee of the Midland and Northern Counties French Bulldog Club were sad to hear of Carol Burton's passing in June 2022.

Carol was Treasurer of the Club, committee member and elected a Patron in 2022.

Carol grew up with different Bullbreeds and owned Boxers later on. She had her first French Bulldogs from the Wilcott kennel. Carol started showing seriously in 1999 with Jordace Dinky Dancer. We became friends around the same time, and started travelling to shows together.

Carol was devoted to the breed and despite her own ill health, she began to help with rehoming French Bulldogs through the Welfare Trust.

Carol's proudest moment in the showring was when her Frank won BOB at Crufts in 2012. He had won consistently from a puppy and gained his Champion title the same year.



During the last few years Carol's health deteriorated and she didn't attend as many shows. She had become a committee member of the Midland and Northern, eventually nominated as Treasurer of the club.

The welfare of French Bulldogs was always her concern. It upset her to see the number of French Bulldogs imported to the UK and the impact this had on the Welfare Trust and sadly how some French Bulldogs suffered.

Always honest and forthright Carol will be missed by the Club and her many friends.

Those who knew her will be sad to learn that Christine died on Dec 22nd 2022. She had been in care for a few years and because of Covid etc., we had not been allowed to visit her for the last 2 years. The funeral took place on January 9th.

Christine had Frenchies for several years before she started to show, keeping them purely as pets while she led a very busy life running one of Surrey's largest hospitals. She had her first show boy from me in the late 70s, when her work load became lighter. He was Tommyville Tamine and she won a CC and res CC with him, and they did very well in Obedience at Open show level too. Christine was the first person to work in Obedience in the breed since Muriel Walker and the Lancefield Frenchies

in the 50s and 60s. The show ring kept her attention too, and her next brindle boy, had a very successful career, becoming Ch. Tommyville Top Hat in the early 80s.

In the late 80s she co-owned Ch. Allaynes Dutch Girl at Tommyville with me, and in the 90s she imported a pied male from Carol and Michael Hawke in America and showed him, Sonlit Jubilee Year, with a lot of success. Christine was a member of the Committees of the FBCE and M&NCFBC at various times, and always worked hard for both clubs. She was breed correspondent for Our Dogs for many years, taking over from me in the 1980s when I moved to Sweden. She enjoyed her judging appointments too – especially her final one, Crufts 2008, where she made Ch. Prinzessin BOB.

She was a great friend, and I miss her – as I know others do too.

I met Neil and Jacky back 1982 when they started in our breed. They previously owned a variety of dogs including Poodles and Great Danes, and Neil had, apparently, spotted a French Bulldog waddling into the ring at a local show. They very soon acquired a couple of Frenchies. A Quattbaby came first, and I remember Neil telling me how Jacky made him sign a document promising that

Sophie would not be shown or bred from. He agreed, on condition that if she didn't eat well, Sophie would have a companion to encourage her. Of course, very quickly she was joined by Suki, from Dick and Margaret Bowgen, her breeders. Both girls were shown locally with some success and, soon, going to more and more shows. Birique was registered as their prefix, and the line was established. At shows, the Bowgens and I, who had been in the breed for a couple of decades, were benched next to Neil, and he and I shared a passion for studying pedigrees and regularly spent hours discussing breeding and blood lines.

We can't forget that Neil was a very talented hairdresser, as Margaret and I soon discovered. Shows were a little different back then, and he often shunted us into a quiet corner, out came the scissors from his top pocket and we had hair-cuts! Eventually I started to drive to his salon in Stoke whenever I could. This was another enjoyable part of life. Neil's salon, where he was often helped by his brother Andrew and Lee, was always full of happy clients, chatting and laughing. On a few occasions we enjoyed the company of a Frenchie too. For most of my life this continued, going to his home after he sold the salon. When I was no longer able to drive, Jacky insisted on driving Neil from Stoke to Northampton and the routine of his doing my hair continued in my home. I am just one of many long-standing clients who will be ever grateful for their help and thoughtfulness.

Back to the dogs -

Neil joined the breed clubs, and worked very hard for the M & N club, eventually being elected to the Committee and later becoming Chairman. This was a position he hated and retired from as soon as his term was over.

Being an Officer at any level was not for him. I remember the sos and 90s as a particularly successful period for the club, with a very large membership, both pet owners and exhibitors. We had wonderful gatherings, always with upwards of 70 people present at the seminars, shows, lunches, garden parties, talks and other super events. Neil was always amongst the hardest workers, and Jacky made sure the kitchen was well supplied with super sandwiches etc.

Neil was a very keen judge of the breed, and was always welcomed into the ring centre in this country. He was also a very popular judge in Scandinavia. On one occasion Neil and Jacky went on a cruise around Norway and left the ship at Stavanger for a day's break on land. To their great surprise and delight, they were met on the docks by a group of Frenchies with their owners. The Norwegians, had been told in advance about their trip, and were so thrilled to be able to plan a get-together.

Whenever Jacky and Neil had a holiday, or for any other reason they needed the dogs cared for - I was the lucky victim. For many years they came to stay at Tommyville, and were totally at home with my family. Some of this time was the era when their beloved Sassie (Ch Birique Prinzessin) was being campaigned, and I am relating this story, not to boost my ego, but to show those of you who weren't around to see it, that Sassie's character and behaviour matched her outstanding beauty!

If you remember Sassie and Neil in the ring, you will remember the little star who paced herself alongside Neil, hardly ever taking her eyes off him for any reason, and doing everything in perfect harmony with him no matter how his disabilities were affecting him at the time. On one occasion she was entered for a show while Neil and Jackie were away, and so I was allowed to handle her. For the only time ever, she pounded round the ring like a naughty puppy. She did twirls of delight at the corners of every triangle, jumped up and down when she thought the judge wasn't looking, and

bounced again, as we shared our joy in holding the CC and Best of Breed cards. Several people, including the judge, did not recognise her, and asked me who the lovely bitch was. Many of us still agree she was the best ever.

The sharing of our dogs wasn't one sided. Neil often took a newly born litter for me, when my work didn't blend in with several nights puppy-watching. Neil insisted, saying he often sat in a chair all night to find comfort, and wanted to baby-sit my new litters. I was able to repay on a few occasions when he found the bending difficult while weaning his litters. As a result of this litter sharing 2 Biriques stayed with me forever. Cassie, Birique Kazalette, never shown, but Top Dog of my gang for 13 years, and Ch. Tarquin, our treasured Quinnie. Neil bred a total of 26 litters, from his A litter to the Zs, and bred 8 champions and many other CC winners.

Luckily I was able to attend the M & N championship show just a few weeks ago. I greeted Neil and Jackie on arrival. Neil looked at me, put his hand in his shirt pocket and greeted me with Tve forgotten my scissors! We spent the day sitting near the judges table where we could see the dogs easily, and the time passed, just as it did some 40 years earlier, while we discussed the Frenchies. It was to be Neil's last show.

So, after just a few of the many happy memories, we remember now, at last, Neil is free from pain. Maybe we can say thank you for the fun and laughter you brought into our lives Neil. We miss you so very much, and can only sympathise with your family who miss you the most.

We know how much he adored and cared about you. I know he will be very close to you all, and smiling on a very special day next July. God bless....

My own first experience of Neil was somewhat enlightening. We had literally just started in the world of showing with our wonderful first Frenchie Rio (still with us at almost 11 years young). I was on the outside of the ring at the club championship taking some pictures of Rio (proud dad) and I also started to wave at her to let her know I was there watching. At this point the enigma approached me and very politely made me aware of a no no that this could be constituted as double handling, I thanked him kindly for making me aware of my potential indiscretion. He then proceeded in going around the room with camera in hand snapping away, with the camera of course.

My wife's first real introduction to Neil was via his ever so lovely and constantly embarrassed wife Jacky. She did her utmost to prepare us both for our very first meeting with Neil, informing us that Neil may appear to be a little blunt at times but he does not mean anything by it, she was not wrong.

If anyone asked Neil what he thought of their dog they may have got a shock as he said it exactly like he thought with both barrels, he always finished on a positive note though. Neil and technology was something I experienced when listening in on MNCFBC meetings. Almost everyone would be up and running with video and sound for the meeting to start, with the exception of one person. About 10 to 15 minutes in there would be the sound of an individual telling us he had joined the meeting after failing to get in the same way as everyone else he would fall back to the faithful phone method. There were some giggles from the rest of those already participating but Neil was unperturbed. In the time we have known Neil he has been every bit the gentleman and made us laugh so many times with his directness of opinion while sitting around the ring camera in hand as usual. His one regret in the show dog world I believe was that he never got to judge at Crufts.

French Bulldog Health Scheme

We are facing the most important time in our breed history for all owners, breeders and enthusiasts to be actively involved to promote a healthier French Bulldog.

The Kennel Club and Breed Health Scheme need your support and particiaption to make a difference to the health and future of our breed.

BASIC HEALTH CHECK - CONFIRMATION OF PARTICIPATION.

The breed specific examination covers Ears, Eyes, Heart, Breathing, Skin, Basic Conformation, temperament etc.

BRONZE LEVEL CERTIFICATE

You must have obtained the **BASIC HEALTH CHECK** and participated in the official **Kennel Club Respiratory Function Grading Scheme.** Heart result with a normal grade.

SILVER LEVEL CERTIFICATE

To have the Bronze Level Certificate with the following results.

Respiratory Function - Grade 0 or 1

 $No strils\ Graded\ -\ Open\ or\ Mild\ \ (Depending\ on\ Vet's\ comments\ exceptions\ can\ be\ made\ for\ moderate\ stenosis).$

Putnam Patella Test - Grade 0 or 1

Heart test with normal grade - result must be within the last 12 months

Hereditary Cataract clear - either by DNA (HC HSF4) or hereditary clear

GOLD LEVEL CERTIFICATE - open to breed standard recognised colours only

The dog must be over 2 years of age.

To have the Bronze and Silver Health Certificate

Respiratory Function Grade 0 or 1 (result taken over the age 2)

Heart Test with normal grade (taken over the age of 2)

Spine x ray and evaluation

Other recommended tests:

Participation in the BVA Eye Scheme

DNA test for Cystinuria Type 3, Degenerative Myelopathy, Hyperuricosuria (HUU).

The Health Scheme is administered by the breed's parent club; The French Bulldog Club of England.

French Bulldog Health Conditions

In general French Bulldogs are quite fit and healthy, and long lived.

It is important to do a general check on your dog and give them regular care.

This may help avoid some of the more common problems French Bulldogs are prone to, such as ear infection, over grown nails, skin infection.

Breeders now have the luxury of being able to screen their dogs for a number of genetic conditions, rather than breeding "blindly".

There is a Health Test Scheme relevant to French Bulldogs, more information can be found in this newsletter. The Kennel Club website has links to all health resources.

There are some conditions where no test is available and these may be hereditary.

The following is a list of some French Bulldog breed issues.

Birth Defects/ Congenital Deformities

Cleft Palate

The failure of the hard and soft palates in the roof of the mouth to close during the dog's embryological development.

Hare Lip

The palate does not fuse together and leaves a hole between the cavities of the mouth and nose.

More frequently seen in Brachycephalic breeds.

It is a simple autosomal recessive disease- an affected puppy has inherited one mutant copy of the gene from each parent.

Hemivertebrae

The spine develops abnormally and creates a twisting wedge in what should be a straight spine. Butterfly shaped vertebrae also appear, which have the potential to cause pressure on the spinal cord.

This is a congenital abnormality of the vertebrae in short backed, brachycephalic, screw tailed breeds.

The abnormality is commonly seen in the thoracic chest area – these generally do not result in severe spinal cord deviation or become a major problem for the affected dog.

Defects in the lumbar area of the spine with kinking and twisting of the spine are more likely to have serious effects on the spinal cord as the dog develops. This is likely to be compression which will cause the dog to be in pain.

Excessively short bodied puppies tend to have more defects than longer bodied dogs.

It is recommended to x- ray all French Bulldog spines prior to breeding – so the breeder is aware what level of Hemivertebrae is present and screen out severe defects.

X- ray around 12 -15 months of age.

Dogs with severe defects should not be bred from.

Bone Disorders

Hip Dysplasia (Screened for in Australia).

Issues with hips are shallow sockets and loose ligaments which will affect the dog's $\,$

movement and potentially cause pain.

<u>Knees/ Stifles Luxating (Slipping) Patella</u> is usually seen in combination with straight stifles and loose ligaments. Health grading is available – Putnam Patellar Luxation Grading System.

Back Problems In French Bulldogs 5 years plus

Intervertebral disc problems which can cause hindquarter paresis (incoordination, scraping of hind feet). In severe cases the hindquarters are totally paralysed. Most dogs respond to rest and arthritis medication without requiring surgery.

<u>Spondylosis</u>

A degenerative change in older dogs - generally responds well to treatment.

Brachycephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome (BOAS)

Combination of long soft palate, narrow nostrils which cause respiratory distress – very noisy breathing, reduced exercise tolerance, heavy snoring are all common symptoms.

Heart Defects

Uncommon to rare in French Bulldogs. In old age French Bulldogs seldom require heart medication.

Eyes

Cherry Eye

Rolled out 3rd eyelid exposing the gland underneath – secondary to loose eyelids and inflammation of the eye. Incidence is low, occurs 6 weeks – 6 months.

Corneal Ulcers

Not uncommon due to prominent nature of relatively large eyes. Treated promptly ulcers respond well to treatment.

Pannus

Black pigment on the cornea with subsequent dry eye. Seen in older Frenchies - 8 years plus.

Responds well to treatment – eye ointment to keep the cornea moist. Can be related to Hypothyroidism.

Thyroid

Hypothyroidism is a reduction in the dog's metabolic state leading to unexplained weight gain, bilateral hair loss, reduced energy, low fertility.

Treatment replaces the missing thyroid hormone.

Skin Conditions

Grass allergy can cause the dog to bite and chew at the feet. This seems more common in Pied colours. Allergies can also be caused by foods including grain and preservatives.

Epilepsy

Does occur but the incidence is low. Usually appears over one year of age, and more common in males. This is a chronic condition which causes the dog to have repeated seizures.

Reproduction

French Bulldogs overall have a good fertility rate. Average litter 4-5 puppies each litter.

Problems associated with whelping with a significant proportion of bitches requiring a caesarean section to deliver the pups. These problems are due to the large head and shoulders in puppies combined with the tapering body shape of the bitch.

Testicles

Male puppies can be affected by Cryptorchidism One or both testicles fail to drop down into the scrotum.

Tumours

French Bulldogs are not high on the tumour list and usually not under 8 years of age.

More common tumours seen – Haemangioma of liver or spleen, Skin – Mast Cell Tumours, Melanoma

Bone tumour - rare. Mammary tumour affects all dog breeds, seen in older non desexed bitches.

Desex your bitch to decrease the risk of mammary tumour and remove the risk of pyometra.


IVDD in French bulldogs

IVDD (intervertebral disc disease) is an inherited condition that is common in French buildogs. Like us, dogs have disc between the bones of their spine. These discs degenerate early in dogs with IVDD, and one or more of them may eventually rupture and put pressure on the spinal cord. Some French buildogs also have congenital vertebral malformations (abnormally shaped vertebrae) which can make it more likely for them to get IVDD.

Signs of IVDD can include:



Colour in French Bulldogs

The only correct colours are: Brindle; Fawn; Pied;

Brindle – Colour pattern caused by a mixture of black hairs and fawn hairs. White markings permitted provided that brindle predominates. Eye rims, eyelashes and lips black.

Fawn – Clear, self-coloured fawn with or without a black mask. White markings permitted, provided that fawn predominates. Cream and red shades less desirable. Eye rims, eyelashes and lips black.

Pied - Brindle Pied: White predominates with brindle patches. (The brindle as defined above).

Fawn Pied: White predominates with fawn patches.

Whites are classified with Pieds for show purposes.

In Pieds, eye rims, eyelashes and lips should preferably be black.

Any white in the above colours should be clear with no ticking or spots.

All other colours highly undesirable, including solid black, black and white, black and tan, mouse, grey/blue, liver/chocolate and all patterns of these colours.

However, if a dog possesses a feature, characteristic or colour described as undesirable or highly undesirable, it is strongly recommended that it should not be rewarded in the show ring.





Breed Appreciation Day

_The Kennel Club requires all Breed clubs to have involvement with a Breed Appreciation Day (BAD) once every two years. The main purpose of the day is to educate both potential show judges, show exhibitors and breeders in the KC Standard for a given breed.

There is provision for a multiple-choice breed exam (MCE) to be taken. The MCE must be passed by those who wish to judge the breed in the future to JEP level 2.

The exam is conducted under the auspices of the KC appointed Breed Education Coordinator.

On 23rd October 2022 The M&NCFBC held a French Bulldog BAD. at the Peace Memorial Hall, Penkridge, Staffordshire. It was attended by nine participants, supported by a number of club members and their dogs.

The main event of the day was a seminar on the French Bulldog breed and its KC Standard led by judge Jackie Mavro-Michaelis, using specially prepared presentation material. The participants then took part in small groups to examine particular aspects of the Frenchie breed using actual dogs as examples, giving them "hands on" knowledge. These aspects were:

General Construction led by Dean Cund; Heads led by Abbie Cund and Movement led by Jackie Mavro-Michaelis. In addition, Angela McInnes gave a short talk on her approach to the judging process. After a buffet lunch prepared by Denise Hopewell the MCE was taken by those participants who had chosen to do it. It was invigilated and marked in accordance with KC requirements and certificateswere awarded to all.

Immediate feedback suggested that all the participants had both enjoyed and benefited from the Day.


